Possessive adjectives:

my, your, his, her....

Possessive pronouns:

mine, yours, his, hers...

Reflexive pronouns:

myself, yourself, himself, herself...

When can we use the verb "do" and "make"?

Did you do the dishes?

Did you do the laundry?

Did you make your bed?

Did you make breakfast?

I made a call.

I called someone.

She made a mess.

He made a lot of money last year.

They got into a fight, but they made up later.

make up = settle an argument.

Past tense:

He lived in Seattle.

live / lived / lived

Past perfect tense:

He had lived in Seattle before he moved to New York.

Can you see the whiteboard okay when I write on it?

I'm still learning how to teach with this arrangement.

It looks like a picture in a mirror.

Present Tense:

I enjoy doing the laundry.

subject: I

verb: enjoy

gerund: doing

I don't enjoy doing the laundry.

I am doing the laundry.

present continuous tense: (be)+ \_\_\_\_ing

I see some children playing.

I don't see any children playing.

verbs of perception: see, listen to, hear, watch, feel

She hears her alarm ringing. (gerund)

Her alarm is ringing.

You want to learn about teaching.

They're sick of going to work.

Gerunds express activity.

I'm interested in attending college.

each and every

Every day I go to school.

Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, ....

Each day I go to school, I become a little better in my English.

Each pizza is different. One has cheese. Another has sausage. Another has green peppers.

The ones I usually get have pepperoni.

Questions:

Verb + Subject + Verb

Are you going to the store?

Verb + Subject

Are you a student?

Verb + Subject + Verb

Do you go to the store on the weekend?

Question word + verb + subject + verb

What do you do?

Where does she live?

I just made a video yesterday that explains the different between the past tense and the present perfect.

**Did** you **learn** anything at school today?

8 a.m. - 3 p.m. You go to school.

4:00 You go home.

(You might not be at school when I ask you a question like this)

**Have** you **learned** anything at school today?

(You are at school when I ask you a questions like this)

can = be able to

I can play the guitar.

I'm able to play the guitar.

I can come to the party tonight.

I will be able to come to the party.

I won't be able to come to your party.

I can't come to your party.

Are you able to speak English?

able --- ability, skill

Can you speak English?

What **did** you **do** yesterday?

What you **do** yesterday? (spoken English)

I can put a link to a transcript of all this on the website and you can download it as a PDF document.

I can type about as quickly as I speak.

This is what I do when I teach my regular classes.

I can give you the opportunity to speak and ask me a question.  
If you want to ask a question (you need a microphone), then write, "I have a question."

All the students should be able to hear you speak.

I can take requests for videos.

ain't = be + not
